23 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Rodriguez-Lipski.

24 MR. ANTUN: Mr. Chairman. Mr.

25 Chairman, regarding this item, we've been -- the

1 department has been informed that for 2026, we're
2 going to get a reduction on the federal portion of
3 this. I'm not sure. I don't know if -- if Lisa or
4 I mean if Director Prusko or Brian Poffel has more
5 information, but there's going to be some challenges
6 to this program in the future. You know, we
7 generally have received over \$7 million and -- but
8 most of it is federal funds, and you know, they've
9 already been informed that there's going to be
10 reductions in this going into next year.

11 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: What kind of
12 what -- but what kind of reduction?

13 MR. ANTUN: I don't know I'll have
14 to --

15 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: And it's next
16 year and it's next year now because --

17 MR. ANTUN: No, no.

18 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: This budget's
19 October 1st.

20 MR. ANTUN: No. Well, this is a
21 calendar year so. And you're right, we're not sure
22 where the federal process is going to wind up.
23 You're right. But right now this is a calendar year
24 of -- I'm sorry this is a fiscal year for us, but
25 they -- they give it to us on a calendar year basis.

1 So you're right. It is going through the federal
2 process now, but unfortunately, there's a lot of
3 uncertainty with that process so that's why the
4 State is notifying counties of this -- of this, of a
5 possibility of a reduction.

6 DIRECTOR PRUSKO: They're telling us
7 to anticipate a reduction for 2026. We're not sure
8 yet.

9 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: Without any
10 direction of 20 --

11 DIRECTOR PRUSKO: No. If Brian is --
12 if Brian's on, I don't know if you can let him
13 answer, he would.

14 MR. ANTUN: Can you unmute Brian
15 Poffel.

16 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Brian, you have
17 him?

18 MR. BORACZEK: Brian should be --
19 Brian should be able to talk now.

20 MR. POFFEL: Can you all hear me
21 okay?

22 MR. BORACZEK: Brian, we can hear you
23 okay.

24 MR. POFFEL: Yeah. So just to
25 elaborate a little bit more, we're anticipating some

1 cuts. Just from what everybody kind of is hearing
2 throughout the news, we don't know what the federal
3 government is going to do. There's some delay in
4 the funding already in this mid-year allocation
5 because our State contacts can't get a hold of
6 federal representation, our federal contacts at
7 different federal levels or offices. So we're
8 already experiencing a little bit of chaos as far as
9 the aging funding is concerned, and a lot of it is
10 just simply from a lack of communication from the
11 federal level.

12 COMMISSIONER CIFELLI: Can I -- can I
13 say something, Mr. Chair? Hello?

14 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Go ahead, Al.

15 COMMISSIONER CIFELLI: Yeah. So
16 piggyback on what Brian said and what Abe said. I'm
17 just trying to capsulize this, but the potential
18 cuts that Abe referred to, are they as a result of
19 the -- for want of a better term, the Big Beautiful
20 Bill, those cuts?

21 I mean, but and then secondly though
22 because of the pending a debt ceiling, perhaps
23 shutdown by the end of this month, we only have
24 another couple of days, the Congress is negotiating
25 back and forth as to whether to restore -- I mean

1 the Democrats want to -- want some to some of the
2 appropriations to be restored, is we don't know
3 where we are with that. We don't know if the
4 country's going to get shut down at the end of the
5 week or not. That's for people above our pay grade.

6 But is that -- is that a succinct
7 explanation of what our problem is as far as
8 budgeting that we don't know because the federal
9 process is still an ongoing process? And some of
10 those cuts that appeared in the Big Beautiful Bill
11 that our great leader has given us those may -- may
12 be coming back to some of those in the form of
13 corrections through the budgetary process shutdown
14 that's coming up in the next week; is that right?

15 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: You've got it
16 right. You've got it right, Al. Everything you
17 said is just what Abe and Lisa said, and right.

18 COMMISSIONER CIFELLI: And so we're
19 not some innocent bystander on the side -- not some
20 disinterested bystander on the sidelines. We have
21 to wait for how that flushes out in Washington?

22 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Yes.

23 COMMISSIONER CIFELLI: All right.

24 MR. ANTUN: And Commissioner, if I
25 can add, and Brian was fairly on point when he said

1 that because of the -- of the cutback in the
2 workforce, it is very difficult to get a hold of
3 someone down there. You know, the money could have
4 been allocated, but the administration may be
5 holding it or not dispersing it, and there's no one
6 there to help or to provide oversight. Right now
7 there's just a lot of confusion, and I think it's
8 intentional because as if you've been following news
9 reports, the President or his administration has
10 been withholding funds for all for a variety of
11 programs, and when you make inquiries there's no one
12 there to respond.

13 COMMISSIONER CIFELLI: Well, that's a
14 product of my opinion. I don't want to be
15 opinionated because we have a business meeting, but
16 my opinion is that's the -- that's the result of
17 Doge or our former fearless Doge leader Mr. Musk
18 decimating the federal workforce. And then just
19 secondly, I think our fearless leader at the top
20 loves chaos so that's where we are. I'm sorry.

21 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Go ahead, Bobby.

22 COMMISSIONER BASELICE: A couple of
23 questions, the contracts this are -- this is
24 January, January, December, for the providers? It's
25 a total money is usually October through September,

1 right? And the providers know that the potential is
2 going to be a decrease in funding?

3 MR. POFFEL: The contracts are
4 January through December. We have been in touch
5 with all of the providers letting them know of where
6 we stand and kind of what process we're -- what
7 we're getting from our State representation and the
8 contacts that they have at the federal level. We
9 have a meeting actually with the providers tomorrow
10 as a matter of fact.

11 COMMISSIONER BASELICE: Is this, a
12 lot -- most of this money goes out towards direct
13 services?

14 MR. POFFEL: Correct.

15 COMMISSIONER BASELICE: Thank you.

16 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Okay. Bill.

17 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: So just say as a
18 general observation, and we did -- we did an
19 exercise with just your ARP fund, remember? It took
20 a little while, but we did it. We did it, we did
21 what I thought was a very effective exercise. What
22 did ARP fund and what are those areas that they were
23 funded that are deemed based on the usage of it are
24 essential. So if we don't find a way to fund it,
25 we're going to -- you probably create a larger

1 problem by not funding it than we create by funding.

2 I think you need to look at generally all
3 federal programs and then analyze what happens with
4 a 10-percent cut, what happens with a 20-percent
5 cut, probably up to and including a 40 or 50-percent
6 cut. And just say what do we do? In what ways can
7 services be better delivered and absorbed and into
8 to what sources of dollars are there, right? The
9 State -- the State will become the first source
10 because we won't be the only one. Whatever we're
11 dealing with, Essex, every other county is dealing
12 with, every major city is going to deal with it.

13 But you know, what not -- what is the old
14 saying? Not failing to plan is planning to fail. I
15 think that we should be ahead of the curve and just
16 take especially larger programs like this that
17 affects -- that especially that affects seniors and
18 say, Okay, well, if it's cut 10 here's what we do.
19 And maybe, maybe we can absorb a 10, 15-percent cut,
20 but we can't absorb -- to some degree we can't
21 really absorb some cuts just from our own
22 limitations of what we can do.

23 But I think we have to do that, and if we
24 fail to do that we're going to find ourselves
25 sitting, you know, next budget year or the following

1 budget year saying to ourselves, you know, we've got
2 one hundred seniors in our audience because suddenly
3 we're not -- we're not picking them up anymore with
4 the TRANSCEND bus, or we're not bringing, you know,
5 and I'm not saying it's all us, we're not bringing
6 the Meals on Wheels and all the other things that
7 are us. I think we literally need to look at that.

8 And obviously, many of these things impact
9 not-for-profits, right? You've got Act Now, you've
10 got the Urban League. You've got adult daycare.
11 Like what are all the options of I don't have a
12 certified home health aide? Normally, we'd say
13 maybe some of this stuff can be you know utilized
14 and absorbed in better billing under Medicaid, but
15 we know Medicaid's under assault. So I mean it's
16 not -- not a simple solution, but I think that we
17 certainly have talented individuals running our
18 departments, and we need to just task them as an
19 exercise to look at.

20 And then publicize it, right to the degree
21 we can publicize it because it's probably going to
22 affect people all over the country. Seniors' cuts
23 affect red as much as they affect blue. So you can
24 show what the effect or impact that is and get that
25 out onto a national forum, that's going to wake up

1 people in red states that have to vote for this
2 also. So I just recommend strongly that the
3 exercise done with ARP, identify large programs that
4 get federal funding, youth -- and youth and seniors
5 and vets will be -- will be three of them, and just
6 lay out what happens.

7 COMMISSIONER CIFELLI: And just --
8 just to piggyback on what Bill said, Bill mentioned
9 the senior programs and youth programs and he's
10 correct, but what is -- what's the impact on the uh
11 provisions of the -- of this bill, the Big Beautiful
12 Bill. I hate to use that phrase, but that's the
13 phrase on SNAP. I mean, how much money comes
14 through that we administer for SNAP, and what's the
15 impact of this bill on SNAP benefits? And then at
16 the end of the day, it's our responsibility to take
17 care of the folks in our -- in our counties.

18 So how does that impact? I'm getting
19 overwhelmed by what may be the ramifications of this
20 bill with our ability to provide for our citizens
21 our constituents.

22 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Bobby.

23 COMMISSIONER BASELICE: I was on a
24 call yesterday where the same conversation was
25 happening about -- happening about Juvenile Justice

1 Department at the federal level. I heard that
2 Brian, I think said that you're having a meeting
3 with the providers. My suggestion at that meeting
4 is you ask them because I used to plan for kids, ask
5 them what they see as potentially things that they
6 could do and they met their all cuts, so we don't
7 lose the program and what they can do to keep their
8 programs intact, but reduce levels of service or
9 whatever and at least keep the programs running.

10 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Okay. Continue,
11 Mr. Clerk.

9 THE CLERK: Resolution No. 17.

13 Services Commission."

14 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Rodriguez-Walker.

15 THE CLERK: Resolution No. 18.
16 Purchasing made under Bergen County --

17 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: Question on 17.

18 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: But for what
19 letter, Bill?

20 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: Which one's
21 Murray. So on -- on A, I guess I would say it on A
22 and B. So we've had, Abe, for a long time because
23 you and I've talked about it a little bit recently,
24 of what we call a first sort -- a First Source
25 ordinance in place, which I think we agree has been

1 poorly enforced for a good period of time. But in
2 the instance of I'm using these two vendors and in
3 the instance of Murray, there was a time where
4 they -- where they were able to take on a couple of
5 people from -- from some of the programs that we
6 have. But it's a no-brainer that they -- that they
7 should.

8 And obviously, you know, we both have
9 programs where individuals are given certifications
10 and OSHA and things where they -- where they may
11 ultimately want to become union employees, but the
12 ability to be able to get hired to work by vendors
13 like this is a critical component for them to get
14 even hands-on experience to be able to ultimately
15 get into a union. So with Murray, there's times
16 that he does union, but most of what Murray does is
17 not.

18 So we need to figure out how we create a
19 program or system where individuals that come from
20 any of a variety of One-Stop training program tied
21 into construction or DOL program tied into
22 construction where he can identify based on the
23 volume of work which is in 10 million a year, 20
24 million a year, within that world, how can he create
25 four or five jobs for what would be entry level and

1 then give them a certain level of training, right?
2 To upgrade their skills where they may ultimately go
3 you know may want to go on to be in a union. They
4 want to go on to do something else, or they're so
5 good they might work for the next 15 years.

6 But it would seem that we can identify at
7 least five to ten very significant vendors that we
8 give multi-million dollars of work to, some may be
9 construction. Some may be suppliers, right? There
10 are companies just in the world of construction that
11 we -- that are major suppliers just. And I'll give
12 you a very simple example. If you're -- if you want
13 to be in the electrical union, you've got to take
14 and pass a written test. You've got to obviously
15 pass an interview.

16 But every year that they're ranked those
17 that get in as apprentices always have at least
18 1,000 hours of hands-on experience either, A,
19 working for a non-union electrical contractor; or B,
20 working for an electrical supply company. So again,
21 the ability to plug in two or three people a year to
22 a Jewel Electric or a Sal Electric creates another
23 opportunity for those individuals ultimately to get
24 hands-on hours necessary to ultimately get into a
25 union. It's not a big, big lift. We're not asking

1 to take 10 or 15 people. I think that whoever is at
2 Michelle Richardson's shop that handles that now, I
3 don't know who has that responsibility.

4 MR. ANTUN: I would speak to Frank
5 Mazza. He can.

6 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: Yeah. I mean,
7 whatever that is, I mean, I think -- I think that
8 just identify the top 10 vendor contractors, and
9 then one by one see how you get them one, two,
10 three, four people. And collectively, you might be
11 able to get 30, 30 people, and then what I would
12 suggest, Frank, to enhance their participation, see
13 how we can tie them into, you know, on the -- OJT
14 contracts. How are we able to tie these individuals
15 down to an OJT contract so 50 percent of the salary
16 that's actually not 50 percent. It's the number of
17 hours that they can justify training, and they get
18 reimbursed for because. It can be more than 50.

19 DIRECTOR MAZZA: Or if they'd be
20 willing to allow the training that they provide to
21 satisfy the work requirement for Welfare. That
22 might be a cost effective way to operate.

23 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: Whatever.
24 Whatever way it is, right? But I get a lot of
25 individuals that are looking for work, and I get a

1 lot of individuals that go through programming, and
2 at the program, after the program, the opportunities
3 aren't necessarily there. And in a lot of places
4 having some real hands-on work experience means a
5 lot when you're -- when you filing -- when you're
6 putting an application in, and probably even with
7 us.

8 So I think that when you have large
9 vendors that are 10 million or more a year, we
10 should -- we should figure out how to get them to
11 agree to take a number, not a crazy number but a
12 number, to maybe even show it as an example, and I
13 know with Murray, there was a couple years where we
14 were able to send him a couple of people. I don't
15 know whatever happened with them where they -- where
16 they ultimately went.

17 But I just think it's a no-brainer. We
18 have a First Source ordinance on the books for what
19 over 20 years. We haven't enforced it. Probably
20 10. That was it. Okay. Thank you.

12 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Cifelli-Lipski.

19 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Sponsor.

20 COMMISSIONER APONTE-LIPSKI: Second.

21 THE CLERK: Resolution No. 31.

22 Resolution declaring 50 Vehicles in the County's
23 Motor Fleet to be surplus and obsolete and auctioned
24 for scrap and eliminated from the County Fleet and
25 Insurance Roster.

1 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Baselice and
2 Lipski.

3 THE CLERK: I-1. Ordinance amending
4 the Hudson County Administrative Code pursuant to
5 the applicable provisions of the optional County
6 Charter Law N.J.S.A. 40:41A-1.

7 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Sponsor. Second,
8 Lipski.

9 THE CLERK: I will --

10 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: Question. Are
11 we used the first I want is consumer protection is
12 that one that's Steve is overseeing.

13 MR. DEPIERRO: Steve is the Chief --
14 Krywinski is the Chief of Consumer Protection,
15 correct.

16 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: So it would be
17 under him?

18 MR. DEPIERRO: That is correct.

19 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: Okay. Thank
20 you.

21 THE CLERK: Commissioners, I will use
22 the ordinance considered for adoption previously.

23 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: I have a
24 question. I have a question. Do we have somebody
25 from the Schools of Technology?

1 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Go down the list.

2 MR. ANTUN: I believe it's Alicia.

3 But I guess, she -- well --

4 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Yes, she's raising
5 her hand.

6 MR. ANTUN: She's raising her hand.

7 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Alicia. Hey.

8 Abraham. Alicia, can you hear us? Alicia?

9 MS. ABRAHAM: Yes, i can.

10 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Okay. Commissioner
11 O'Dea has a question. Go ahead.

12 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: So on the bond
13 ordinance related to the Schools of Technology, some
14 of the items -- so you have \$450,000 to purchase
15 school buses. How many buses will be purchased for
16 that?

17 MS. ABRAHAM: I don't know, but I'll
18 find out for you.

19 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: All right.
20 Here's my -- here's my concern. My understanding is
21 that you recently raised the fees related to the
22 buses, and I guess my concerns get raised more when
23 I have to start paying those fees. But here -- but
24 here's my thoughts, and I have a major concern about
25 this. The fact that you charge a flat paying for

1 the cost of a driver, understood. I assume that the
2 drivers that you have there are only paid for
3 whatever, six hours a day. They work from 6:30 to 9
4 or 6 to 9 and then from 2 to 5 or whatever; whatever
5 that breakup is, and that it would make no sense to
6 pay them during the middle because then they'd be
7 being paid over time. I don't know what the rate
8 would be for all the time.

9 But paying the 50 an hour cost of a driver
10 seems fair and reasonable. Paying a \$250 fee to use
11 a bus that we paid for in addition to the driver
12 seems to be make no sense in my world. So
13 additionally paying a \$250 fee for a bus
14 irregardless of whether that bus is traveling 10
15 miles or a hundred miles makes absolutely no sense
16 in my world.

17 So I have a concern of that aspect of
18 this, of this bond moving forward until that issue
19 gets rectified, specifically as it relates to buses
20 for which are related to County-sponsored-type
21 functions. I'll leave mine out of the question for
22 now, but let's talk about boat ride. So for senior
23 boat rides, we utilize those -- those buses,
24 correct?

25 DIRECTOR TOON: Yes.

1 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: Those buses
2 simply travel very short distances because they go
3 from points in the County to Weehawken. So they're
4 not traveling far away. They've got to drop them
5 off and then they pick them up at the end of the
6 boat ride and bring them back. And those also work
7 within what's I call the sweet window when those
8 drivers are not doing anything else. So you're not
9 bringing a driver in. It's not on a weekend, which
10 makes sense. That should be a different rate in and
11 of itself because you already have individuals in
12 there.

13 But I'm not going to delve at this moment
14 that that deep into it, but I need somebody for
15 Thursday maybe have the new administrator available
16 live or -- live or by Zoom because I want to have a
17 discussion about it. They need -- they need to
18 change that rental. That rental should, one, be a
19 different rate for the people who bought it. Like I
20 was joking with Jonathan, if I buy your car, every
21 time I get in the car, you're charging me for you to
22 drive me somewhere in my own car? Now, if I had to
23 pay a driver to take me, I don't mind paying the
24 driver. If there's gas, I don't mind paying for the
25 gas, but we're buying the car so I don't understand

1 that.

2 And then secondly beyond that, I don't
3 understand a rate that's not tied into mileage but
4 it's rather tied into a number. So I travel 120
5 miles in each direction, I get charged 250. I
6 travel eight mile in each direction, I get charged
7 250. That makes no sense in any world that I come
8 from because any tie into any fee for the bus,
9 again, not sure outside of paying for gas, why we
10 should pay for any rental of the bus. You usually
11 tie it into the use or the wear and tear on a
12 vehicle. So I need the superintendent to be
13 available for Thursday for questioning.

14 MS. ABRAHAM: Okay. I will let him
15 know.

16 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Business
17 administrator. You mean business administrator you
18 said?

19 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: Both. I'm not
20 sure that -- yeah, who's the business -- acting
21 business administrator?

22 MS. ABRAHAM: Currently, an acting
23 business administrator.

24 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: Have them both.
25 Have them both ready.

1 MS. ABRAHAM: Okay.

2 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: Yeah, I'm fine
3 with it, but if I don't get a good resolution, I'm
4 going to discuss it at the meeting.

5 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Okay. Thank you,
6 Alicia.

7 MS. ABRAHAM: You're welcome.

8 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: Inform both
9 parties. Darice, can you provide a pretty simple
10 e-mail to us, when was the rate change and how much
11 had it changed? Like what was the rate before and
12 how's the rate just got changed now?

13 THE CLERK: Mr. Chairman, I will now
14 turn it over to the Administration.

15 MR. ANTUN: I have no additional
16 items.

17 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: So two things,
18 Mr. Administrator and Mr. Chairman. One and I spoke
19 to Carmen before the meeting. We had -- we had an
20 issue of concerning legislation related to
21 protections for undocumented, and I think we agreed
22 we were going to sponsor as a Board as a whole. She
23 didn't get a chance to rest it yet so, but she will
24 have it for Thursday; is that correct?

25 MS. MENDIOLA: That's correct,

1 Commissioner.

2 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: So I'll just --
3 that will be a late walk-on the Thursday's meeting
4 to put -- to put um every everyone on notice.

5 Then I had -- I had a question for Frank
6 Mazza. Frank, when you're provided for any type of
7 shelter or transitional housing --

8 DIRECTOR MAZZA: Yes.

9 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: A new location,
10 what -- who undertakes touring that facility to make
11 sure it meets whatever requirements it has to have?

12 DIRECTOR MAZZA: It depends what type
13 of facility it is. So if you're just renting like
14 TRA, and the agreement is between the client and the
15 person and the landlord, the benefit is to the
16 client. So we don't tour that place so we -- they
17 haven't --

18 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: You charge a day
19 rate?

20 DIRECTOR MAZZA: You charge a day
21 rate. It would either be the social services office
22 or whatever program is operating the -- whatever
23 program is operating the housing. I don't know
24 specifically what program.

25 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: So they go to

1 the facility?

2 DIRECTOR MAZZA: Yes.

3 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: They tour the
4 facility?

5 DIRECTOR MAZZA: Yes.

6 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: And they provide
7 I guess a written report that confirms whatever.

8 DIRECTOR MAZZA: Yes.

9 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: This facility
10 has X amount of room, X amount of beds.

11 DIRECTOR MAZZA: Correct.

12 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: Whatever,
13 whatever that is. All right so.

14 DIRECTOR MAZZA: Yeah.

15 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: So if I asked
16 for a variety of sites, you could get me a copy
17 quickly of whatever that report was.

18 DIRECTOR MAZZA: I could, yes.

19 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Okay. Two things
20 Happy Rosh Hashanah to all our staff and
21 constituents. And also congratulations to Director
22 Gibney. Now that gives Billy more of an opportunity
23 to have more questions for you.

24 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: How many
25 departments do we have? So statutorily how many

1 were you allowed to have?

2 MR. ANTUN: You know, it's a
3 combination of 20. We can have departments
4 divisions.

5 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: Okay. It can't
6 be more than 20. So you can have 20 in total
7 between departments and divisions and there's no
8 breakup. You could have conceptually 13 departments
9 and seven divisions. Because on a municipal level,
10 I always thought we had a limit of like nine
11 departments. I don't think we have the same level
12 of like, you know, over the phone. Yeah, we have a
13 similar.

14 And then my last issue that I had -- was I
15 looks to see that he's actually on, and I had a
16 conversation with Adam earlier because he's
17 obviously this is his -- his holiday, his holy day.
18 So he was -- he was not here today, nor he should
19 have been expected to be here. But we spoke briefly
20 about the progress with mental health court. It's
21 my understanding that he has or will within the next
22 day submit the proposed budget or the proposed
23 expenditure of the dollars from the grant we
24 received through the State of New Jersey.

25 MR. ANTUN: Yes.

1 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: I had asked that
2 when you get that that you share that with the
3 Board, and that if you're not ready for it by this
4 meeting, that by next meeting, you're able to give
5 us a timeline to whether court should be fully
6 operational and function.

7 And then lastly, I guess when we have the
8 folks from the School of Technology here Thursday to
9 talk about the other idea? That was all I.

10 COMMISSIONER WALKER: I just got one
11 question. Who from the -- who police or governs
12 over the First Source? Who enforces it from our
13 perspective?

14 MR. ANTUN: Well, it's overseen by
15 Frank Mazza. What happens is the Law Department
16 sends over the copies of the contracts, and then a
17 staff within Frank Mazza reviews that and follows up
18 with the vendor to see what their needs are and to
19 see how we can match.

20 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Go ahead, Bobby.

21 COMMISSIONER BASELICE: I just want a
22 little shout out to Gina Hulings and Brian. We
23 piloted in North Bergen a Hoboken Historic Tour. It
24 went really, really well. They went around and --

25 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Did they end up

1 with any pipes break under your bus?

2 COMMISSIONER BASELICE: No pipes.

3 Very nice. The scene was really enjoyed. Just want
4 to commend them on tour.

5 COMMISSIONER CIFELLI: You didn't
6 find Jimmy Quinn's safe deposit box?

7 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: I got that one.
8 Okay. Any Commissioners? Anybody? Motion.

9 THE CLERK: All in favor? We are
10 adjourned.

11 (Whereupon the proceeding is then
12 concluded at 5:20 p.m.)
