2 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Baselice and
3 Kopacz.

4 THE CLERK: Resolution No. 3.
5 Resolution Authorizing the Application for and the
6 Acceptance of Funds for the County-Based Innovative
7 Programs and Authorizing Fair and Open Competitive
8 Contract with Partners in Prevention, October 1st,
9 2025 through September 29th, 2026. \$244,756.

10 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Rodriguez and
11 O'Dea. Is that O'Dea? Kopacz. I'm sorry.
12 Rodriguez and Kopacz. They sound alike up there.

13 THE CLERK: Resolution No. 4. 2025
14 Budget Amendment, New Jersey Department of Human
15 Services County-Based Innovation Project Opioids,
16 \$244,756.

17 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Lipski and
18 Baselice.

19 THE CLERK: Resolution No. 5.
20 Resolution Authorizing the County to Accept Student
21 Adult Financial Assistance Programming Fund from the
22 New Jersey Division of Vocational Rehabilitation
23 Service for the Hudson County Project SEARCH
24 Program. October 1st, 2024 through September 30th,
25 2027; up to \$15,600 per intern.

1 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Lipski and Kopacz.

2 THE CLERK: Resolution Authorizing
3 the Application for and the Acceptance of Funds if
4 Awarded from the New Jersey Office of Information
5 Technology for FY2026 911 Next Generation Grant
6 Program, July 1st, 2025 to June 30th, 2030.
7 \$482,830.82.

8 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Romano-Rodriguez.

9 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: I have a
10 question.

11 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Go ahead, Bill.
12 What's your number?

13 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: I have a
14 question going back on No. 5.

15 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: No. 5.

16 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: So this program
17 started in 2024, right? So I'm looking at the
18 memos. 11-4-24; 10-1-24; 9-3-25. How much of this
19 money has been already spent?

20 DIRECTOR TOON: Good afternoon.
21 Darice Toon, Health and Human Services.
22 Commissioner, I don't remember the specific amount
23 but we'll certainly get that information to you. We
24 are able to get I think it's \$15,000 or \$15,600 per
25 student. Yes, \$15,600 per intern. And it helps to

1 cover different costs for the program.

2 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: What's the total
3 amount of the grant you initially received?

4 DIRECTOR TOON: There's no specific
5 total amount that we get. It depends on the number
6 of interns we have. So it varies from year to year.
7 I can tell you what we received for the last year.

8 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: Yeah. I'd like
9 to know what we received, and obviously, how many
10 interns did we get. Is there a limit to how many
11 you can have?

12 DIRECTOR TOON: There really is
13 because these interns are in different classrooms.
14 We have a limit in terms of the number of people
15 that we can accept. But I'll get that information
16 to you.

17 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: What do you mean
18 they're in different classrooms?

19 DIRECTOR TOON: When we assign them,
20 for example, we have three different locations where
21 the students are assigned. This particular program
22 is for those young people who are out of school now.
23 They're 21 to 30 years old, and there's a job
24 developer or what have you, a person who is assigned
25 to work with them through the board. And there's

1 only one sort of class that they're in. I don't
2 know what the maximum number is for the class, but
3 depending on what that number is, if we reach that
4 max, then we get \$15,600 for each of those interns.

5 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: So what they do
6 is they get a career and develop transferable job
7 skills?

8 DIRECTOR TOON: Yes. Yes.

9 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: So the
10 individual or individuals that you've had there now,
11 show that they were able to obtain a full-time
12 permanent job?

13 DIRECTOR TOON: We find that -- we
14 can get that information. These are primarily
15 special needs individuals, and they're either
16 assigned to one of our sites at the hospital. RWJ
17 Barnabas is a site. We also have a site with Hudson
18 County Community College as well. And those young
19 people are either they may be hired. We've had some
20 interns who were hired by that particular, whatever
21 site they're getting the training in. And in other
22 cases, they seek employment elsewhere.

23 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: You have the
24 ability to -- are there any offerings that are not
25 governmental or based on the -- based on what they

1 learn there, they have to, it has to be, although
2 obviously Barnabas isn't government, right?

3 DIRECTOR TOON: No, they're not. But
4 they've hired quite a few of the interns over the
5 years.

6 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: I'm just
7 curious, are there other people which is not tapping
8 in that would hire interns and then offer them
9 opportunities? Is it healthcare? It seems like a
10 nice program. You're getting \$15,000.

11 DIRECTOR TOON: It is.

12 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: You're paying up
13 to \$8,000 for the transportation, right? It's up to
14 \$27,000 per person. And it would seem that there
15 would be other individuals that would be, or types
16 of industries that would be interested in doing that
17 where they might be able to help them.

18 DIRECTOR TOON: Right. They actually
19 don't get -- those industries do not get the
20 funding.

21 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: Oh, I
22 understand. But I'm meaning that industries don't
23 have to lay any money out of my pockets.

24 DIRECTOR TOON: That's true. That's
25 correct.

1 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: I'm going to use
2 Landmark, right? Okay? Liberty House, View, et
3 cetera, their ability to bring a person in, they get
4 paid under this. They've got a myriad of potential
5 areas they could work in, right?

6 DIRECTOR TOON: They have to go
7 through a few.

8 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: There's a whole
9 bunch of opportunities that they might be able to
10 work there. It seems like a good program, and if
11 there's a lot of funding for it, the more we're able
12 to identify potential places.

13 DIRECTOR TOON: Right. Most of the
14 funding is covering the tuition for the program.
15 So, it's covering the tuition. For example, we
16 partnered with the Jersey City Board of Education.
17 They're our lead school district. So that funding
18 is covering, you know, the board has to cover the
19 tuition costs for the young people who are
20 participating in the program.

21 For those who are over school age, like 21
22 to 30, then DVRS covers, you know -- offsets some of
23 that cost through this particular grant.

24 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: I'm just saying,
25 I think if you promoted it, there are other

1 potential agencies that would, and I know that we
2 have enough individuals that fit the criteria that
3 we could help. That's all I'm saying.

4 DIRECTOR TOON: We would love to get
5 more businesses, particularly hotel partners or
6 hospital partners for this. We would love to.

7 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Question. Do you
8 work with, Darice, do you work at all with the
9 community college with that? Because I know I was
10 taking their interns when I was in the police
11 department in Hoboken. In other words, is the
12 program just suited for certain firms at the hotels?
13 Is it medical? Or is it all different fields?

14 DIRECTOR TOON: It's suited for
15 different industries, but it's got to be the kind of
16 industry that has, that will enable the students to
17 at least have three different types of internship
18 experiences.

19 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: So it would be like
20 with the Prosecutor's Office or something like that?

21 DIRECTOR TOON: No.

22 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: How about like HRH,
23 Hudson Regional Hospital?

24 DIRECTOR TOON: Oh, we could.
25 Absolutely. We would love to.

1 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: I mean, we seem to
2 be bailing them out all the time. They should be
3 helping us too.

4 DIRECTOR TOON: We'd love to. We
5 could. I mean, yeah, we have room to partner with
6 other companies, you know, or businesses, or what
7 have you, other hospitals or you know, hotels. We
8 would love. Hotels are great sites, but you know,
9 not every business is going to be the -- you know,
10 the best fit for it.

11 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: Have anybody
12 tried the W?

13 DIRECTOR TOON: We've tried some of
14 the hotels. We did have students at the DoubleTree
15 Downtown Jersey City, but after the pandemic sort
16 of -- I don't know if things have picked up now and
17 they hired you know, a student or two. Things
18 slowed down a lot for them and they weren't able to,
19 but we are looking for other hotels. Have any
20 connections, let us know.

21 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Thanks, Darice.
22 Continue, Mr. Clerk.

23 THE CLERK: For the record,
24 Commissioner Walker is on via Zoom. Resolution No.

8 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Lipski and

17 Kopacz.

18 THE CLERK: Resolution No. 13.

19 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Bill.

20 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: So I assume this
21 isn't the first year we've done this, right?

22 MS. ANTUN: Darice?

23 DIRECTOR TOON: You're correct.

24 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: Can we get
25 provided to show what these same entities got last

1 year?

2 DIRECTOR TOON: Sure.

3 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: Versus this
4 year?

5 THE CLERK: For the record,
6 Commissioner Cifelli is on via Zoom.

7 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Thank you.

8 MS. ANTUN: Darice, what the
9 Commissioner was asking for is what the amounts that
10 they got last year, has that changed?

11 DIRECTOR TOON: I don't think so,
12 Commissioner, but I need to verify. Both are pretty
13 much the same, but I will need to verify that.

14 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: Can you just
15 verify what that is? And then that would, you know,
16 assist us in understanding. But some of these
17 things are really minute amount of dollars.

18 DIRECTOR TOON: Yeah.

19 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: \$10,000, I'm not
20 sure what kind of program you can do.

21 DIRECTOR TOON: It just offsets --
22 right, it just offsets the cost, Commissioner. It
23 doesn't cover the full cost.

24 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Thank you.

25 THE CLERK: Resolution No. 13.

1 Resolution authorizing Calendar Year 2026 Peer
2 Grouping Allocations to Government Agencies, January
3 1st, 2026 through December 1st, 2026, \$95,000.

4 COMMISSIONER APONTE-LIPSKI: Sponsor.

5 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Second.

6 THE CLERK: Resolution No. 14.

7 Resolution approving award of a Community
8 Development Grant funding to the Township of
9 Harrison for FY2024, July 1st, 2024 through
10 September 1st, 2031, \$111,433.

11 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Al Cifelli,
12 sponsor. Rodriguez, second.

13 THE CLERK: Resolution No. 15.

14 Resolution amending Resolution No. 452-8-2025 and
15 relocating FY2025 Ryan White "Part A" Formula Grant
16 Awards, March 1st, 2025 through February 28th, 2026
17 \$11,000.

18 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Aponte and Kopacz.

19 THE CLERK: Resolution No. 16.

20 Resolution authorizing a Non-Fair and Open
21 Professional Services Contract with the Young Men
22 Christian Association YMCA of Newark and Vicinity
23 for the operation of Youth Shelter Services for
24 Hudson County Youth in need of shelter, January 1st,
25 2026 through December 31st, 2026, \$161,330.

1 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Board as a whole.
2 Question, Bill.

3 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: We provide two
4 guaranteed beds, right? And we ask this question
5 every year. So it says there's an average bed usage
6 of 1.27. Do we get -- can you show us on how many
7 days we exceeded the two? I guess the most we can
8 do is four, right?

9 DIRECTOR TOON: So Commissioner, do
10 you want a total of the number of beds that we on
11 days when we received -- when we I guess exceeded
12 two beds or do you want just a total?

13 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: How many days
14 did we do three beds? How many days did we do four
15 beds?

16 DIRECTOR TOON: Okay.

17 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: I would just be
18 curious. I would just be curious to know that it
19 also would be good to know the average stay.

20 DIRECTOR TOON: The length of stay?

21 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: Is there a
22 maximum amount of stay that you can do? Obviously,
23 who transports these individuals to school? You
24 were paying \$241 a day, right?

25 DIRECTOR TOON: Right.

1 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: It looks like it
2 includes meals, correct?

3 DIRECTOR TOON: Yes.

4 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: It says all this
5 individual, group tutoring, anger management,
6 educational. It tells you everything in the world.
7 I have no idea how we measure how much of each of
8 those areas they actually get on a weekly basis.
9 How much of these services are really provided, or
10 is it just you've got access to a tutor?

11 DIRECTOR TOON: They get pretty much
12 those services. They do a great job.

13 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: Do they have an
14 individual for each of these things? Individual
15 group counseling, life skills, tutoring, anger
16 management, educational, cultural, vocational,
17 career testing, job readiness. I would love to see
18 a report, right? It's not a huge amount. It's only
19 \$161,000.

20 But it would be great. It would be great
21 to do two things. Look at the number of individuals
22 that went through, what their average length of stay
23 was and what's the outcome. I'd love to go back
24 even two or three years. Where are they now?
25 Where's someone that stayed there for four months or

1 six months, two or three years ago? Did they
2 complete their high school? Did they -- whatever,
3 you know. Did they find a job? Did they go to
4 college? I'm just curious to see at the end of the
5 day or on the flip side, did they wind up getting
6 arrested and are now in an adult penal institution?

7 DIRECTOR TOON: That -- yeah, that
8 Commissioner. I don't know that they keep data
9 going back multiple years. I can tell you that for
10 most of our juvenile justice programs, this isn't a
11 State-funded one but the State certainly doesn't
12 require, doesn't even allow for us to go back to
13 track kids in that kind of a way.

14 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: I mean, we
15 should. At the end of the day, what happens? What
16 happens when they leave there?

17 DIRECTOR TOON: I mean, I can talk
18 with the judge about that, but I mean --

19 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: The judge would
20 probably pull a list of individuals and track what
21 happened to those individuals?

22 DIRECTOR TOON: Yeah. I'd have to
23 talk with the judge about that and find out
24 whether -- what they do in terms of tracking
25 individuals.

1 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: I have a question
2 about that. Are juveniles in need of supervision
3 come under the umbrella in some shape or form of the
4 Department of Corrections anymore?

5 DIRECTOR TOON: No. No, nothing. We
6 work closely with Corrections but no.

7 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: What was your
8 question, Anthony?

9 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: I didn't know if
10 JINS still had any interaction under the umbrella of
11 the Department of Corrections.

12 MS. ANTUN: These are individuals
13 that can't stay in home for a reason. It's not
14 because they've done anything.

15 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Right.

16 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: So it's not like
17 a JINS shelter. It's not like Murdoch Hall used to
18 be?

19 MS. ANTUN: Right.

20 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: Back in the day.
21 Was it at Murdoch Hall?

22 MS. ANTUN: Yes.

23 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: That was those
24 that were charged. Is that what this is now, or no?

25 COMMISSIONER BASELICE: No, they took

1 over from Consultation Services which used to be in
2 Jersey City, right? Back there by Murdoch Hall.
3 They used to have, I think 14 beds.

4 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Yes.

5 COMMISSIONER BASELICE: Back there.
6 Director Toon, you can check because some of the
7 contracts, those juvenile contracts, do have a
8 provision that they follow up 30, 60, 90 days,
9 usually only goes to 90 days, to see if the child
10 remained out of the system or they came back in the
11 system.

12 DIRECTOR TOON: It may be at 30 or
13 60, I'm not sure, but I can tell you that we've
14 consulted with the State about that, and they've
15 made it very clear that they were not happy with the
16 fact that we were even exploring the possibility of
17 tracking juveniles whether it be six months after or
18 what have you, Commissioner. We had a conversation
19 about that at one point before. They indicated that
20 that goes against their policy.

21 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Is the reason being
22 that they're not charged with any criminal offense?

23 COMMISSIONER BASELICE: What policy
24 does it go against?

25 DIRECTOR TOON: The YJC. Now, I'm

1 not saying for the youth shelter beds. I don't
2 know. I'll have to talk with the judge about these.
3 But in terms of tracking the young people from --

4 COMMISSIONER BASELICE: That was
5 always their requirement.

6 DIRECTOR TOON: Yeah. Well, I can
7 tell you that we've consulted with them about that.

8 COMMISSIONER BASELICE: That used to
9 be a requirement for their level of service.

10 DIRECTOR TOON: They probably changed
11 it then.

12 COMMISSIONER BASELICE: Yeah,
13 possibly.

14 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: They don't care.
15 They don't care what happens to them. They don't
16 want to monitor whether they wind up back in the
17 system.

18 DIRECTOR TOON: I'm not going to say
19 that they don't care. I think there's some kind of
20 rational reason. I will happily get that
21 information. I will happily get that information.

22 MS. ANTUN: Mr. Chairman, if I may,
23 Commissioner, just keep something in mind since
24 tomorrow's meeting is at one o'clock. We may not be
25 able to get you -- we'll get you the information. I

1 just wanted to let you know that.

2 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: These are young
3 people that can go in one of two directions, right?
4 And in one direction they get on a great path
5 whatever they do in their life. In the other
6 direction they may be spending most of their adult
7 life in a criminal institute, criminal penal
8 institution. Everything that needs to be done to
9 give them the best chance to go the other path, we
10 should do even if it costs us a little more money.
11 But \$241 a day ain't chump change.

12 THE CLERK: Resolution No. 17.
13 Approve Purchasing Agent's Awards, purchases made

15 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Rodriguez and
16 Walker.

17 THE CLERK: Resolution No. 18.

22 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Rodriguez and
23 Walker.

24 THE CLERK: Resolution No. 19.

2 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Rodriguez and
3 Walker.

4 THE CLERK: Resolution No. 20.
5 Purchases made under the Union County Cooperative
6 Pricing System.

7 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Rodriguez and
8 Walker.

9 THE CLERK: Resolution No. 21.
10 Approve Purchasing Agent's Awards.

11 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Rodriguez and
12 Walker.

13 THE CLERK: Resolution No. 22.
14 Approve Purchasing Agent's Awards, construction
15 contracts.

16 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Rodriguez and
17 Walker. Question.

18 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: When is it
19 anticipated the project will begin, and what is the
20 estimated timeline for it to be completed?

21 MR. KATARYNIAK: It's a 90-day
22 construction duration contract and will most likely
23 start in the spring.

24 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: Does that mean
25 it's going to be a significant disruption while the

1 work's being done?

2 MR. KATARYNIAK: No, all the work
3 will be to one side of the street. It's a barrier.
4 The predominant part of the project is constructing
5 construction concrete barrier for the bike lane
6 separation so traffic can get pushed to the north
7 side. It'll be done under either alternating
8 traffic or off-peak hours.

9 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: Can you provide
10 me whatever that plan is? Additionally, can you
11 ensure that there's a North Lincoln Park
12 Association? Jonathan can ascertain the contact for
13 them. That they be advised that this is -- already
14 advised of what we're doing and then additionally
15 advise them we'll have a meeting where the
16 contractor can meet with them, understand what
17 they're going to do, understand their timeline, and
18 then provide them with a contact person because
19 things will come up as they always do.

20 MR. KATARYNIAK: We're going to have
21 a pre-construction meeting, and we'll have
22 notifications to all the businesses along the
23 street.

24 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: Again, this is a
25 neighborhood association, not a business. Most of

1 Duncan Avenue do not have businesses. They're
2 businesses on a corner. The rest are just
3 residential properties whose parking will be --
4 whose parking will be disrupted, and then what
5 happens to the parking after this is done?

6 MR. KATARYNIAK: The parking is
7 unchanged when this is done. This is just the west
8 leg, west of 1 and 9 to the river. It's just the
9 west leg of 1 and 9 to the river so it's really only
10 the businesses in the back there that are impacted.

11 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: Oh, okay.

12 MR. KATARYNIAK: Yeah, the one by the
13 park is done.

14 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: I thought they
15 would do one on the other side of Duncan.

16 MR. KATARYNIAK: Oh, of course.

17 MS. ANTUN: Yeah, because the city
18 did that.

19 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: Forget
20 everything I just told you.

21 MR. KATARYNIAK: Got it.

22 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Denise is doing the
23 test run on the bike. Denise will be on the bike.

24 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: That will
25 connect.

1 MR. KATARYNIAK: This basically
2 connects what Jersey City ran all the way to the
3 Hackensack River.

4 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Go ahead, Mr.
5 Clerk. We hear bells. The bells of St. Mary's.

6 THE CLERK: I need as many prayers as
7 I can get, Commissioners. But I've got to learn how
8 to turn it off too.

9 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Oh, it's yours?

10 THE CLERK: Yeah, it's me.
11 Resolution No. 23. Resolution authorizing the
12 renewal of a Fair and Open Competitive contract with
13 Tetra Tech, Inc., for the Preparation of
14 Environmental Review Records for Projects Funded by
15 the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban

18 COMMISSIONER KOPACZ: Sponsor,
19 Kopacz.

20 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Who was that down
21 there? Aponte. Question. Wild Bill.

22 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: I assume these
23 are billed on an hourly basis.

24 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Darice, stay up
25 there, please, unless you want to get exercise.

1 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: All the
2 questions have gone your way today.

3 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: You should have
4 worn your sneakers today.

5 DIRECTOR TOON: I can use the steps.
6 Commissioner, they're paid based on actual services
7 performed, and I believe it is hourly.

8 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: How many years
9 have they done that?

10 DIRECTOR TOON: I think only a couple
11 of years.

12 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: How much have
13 they billed this for each of them?

14 DIRECTOR TOON: I don't know,
15 Commissioner. I can find out.

16 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: That's something
17 you should be able to find out by tomorrow.

18 DIRECTOR TOON: I can get that by
19 tomorrow, without a doubt. That I can get by
20 tomorrow.

21 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: From what
22 funding source does this money come from?

23 DIRECTOR TOON: Community Development
24 Block Grant and HOME.

25 MS. ANTUN: It's the environmental

1 reviews that we have to do.

2 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: We only spend
3 \$70,000 a year. Why am I budgeting a contract for
4 \$120,000?

5 DIRECTOR TOON: We never know. It
6 might be a lot less than that, quite frankly,
7 Commissioner.

8 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: I know, but then
9 I can take \$50,000 and give it to a program or
10 project that might need the money.

11 DIRECTOR TOON: At this point, we're
12 really not -- you know, we're in a good place in
13 terms of funding.

14 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: We have less
15 money coming from the federal government.

16 DIRECTOR TOON: Yeah.

17 THE CLERK: Resolution No. 24.
18 Resolution awarding a three-year of a Fair and Open
19 competitive contract with Visiting Homemakers
20 Service of Hudson County, Inc., for Title 20
21 Certified Home Health Care Services, January 1st,

23 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: How about Board as
24 a whole? Go ahead.

25 THE CLERK: Resolution No. 25.

1 Resolution approving the renewal of an award of a

3 Health Care Service Providers, January 1st, 2026
4 through December 31st, 2026. \$335,000.

5 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Kopacz and Lipski.

6 THE CLERK: Resolution No. 26
7 resolution awarding a four-year of a Fair and Open
8 Competitive Contract with EMET Transitional Service
9 LLC, for Housing and Reintegration Services, January
10 1st, 2026 through December 31st, 2026, \$1,200,000.

11 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Board as a whole.

12 COMMISSIONER O'DEA: For that kind of
13 money, yeah.

14 THE CLERK: Resolution amending
15 Resolution No. 353-6-2025 to extend the Community
16 Development Block Grant Coronavirus II Grant Program
17 contact periods for Catholic Charities Archdiocese
18 of Newark and North Hudson Community Action
19 Corporation for physical improvements to health
20 facilities, July 1st, 2025 to June 30th, 2026; no
21 cost extension.

22 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Lipski and
23 Rodriguez.

24 THE CLERK: Resolution No. 28.
25 Resolution amending Resolution No. 384-7-2025 for

1 the cost contract extension of the Waterfront
2 Project in North New Jersey Legal Services under
3 Community Block Grant COVID II Grant Program,
4 January 1st, 2025 to June 30th, 2026; no cost
5 extension.

6 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Kopacz and Aponte.

7 THE CLERK: Resolution No. 29.

8 Resolution authorizing Year Three of a fair and open
9 competitive contract with various providers and
10 contracts with governmental organizations under
11 CY2026 Youth Service Commission State Community
12 Partnership Family Court Funds, January 1st, 2026
13 through December 31st, 2026, \$1,357,137.

14 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Board as a whole.

15 THE CLERK: Resolution No. 30.

16 Resolution authorizing amendment to Resolution No.
17 309-6-2025 and memorandum of understanding between
18 the New Jersey Division of Medical Assistance and
19 Health Services and the County of Hudson for
20 Calendar Year 2025.

21 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Kopacz and Aponte.

22 THE CLERK: Resolution No. 31.

23 Resolution approving the execution of a Memorandum
24 of Understanding and if consummated, the entry of
25 Shared Service Agreement between Bergen, Hudson, and

1 Passaic Counties for shared services of a Joint
2 Medical Examiner's Office.

3 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Baselice-Romano.

4 MS. ANTUN: I just wanted to make a
5 statement on this. Mr. Chairman, this item has
6 gone, you know, we've been evaluating this for
7 several years. Bergen County initially got a shared
8 services study grant that would include Hudson and
9 Passaic for the ME services, medical examiner
10 services, and we're at a point now where we want to
11 proceed with this project.

12 Bergen County has gone out to bid, and
13 they are looking to award a contract so that they
14 can enhance their facility to accommodate Hudson and
15 Bergen so. And we're also in the process of
16 negotiating with the Northern Region in Newark to at
17 some point get out of that agreement so that we can
18 join Bergen County.

19 And with this shared service and this MOU,
20 Bergen County requested that we obligate ourselves
21 to go through with this program because, obviously,
22 they're going to incur some costs and, you know,
23 they wanted assurances from Hudson and Passaic that
24 we were going to go through with this.

25 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Good idea, though.

1 MS. ANTUN: And we believe that we'll
2 get an equal or better product working with Bergen
3 County.

4 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Good. Continue,
5 Mr. Clerk.

6 THE CLERK: I-1. Ordinance amending
7 Chapter 200, Article 13 of the Administrative Code
8 for the installation of stop signs in the
9 County-owned roadway in the city of Hoboken.

10 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: I'll sponsor.

11 COMMISSIONER KOPACZ: Second.
12 Kopacz.

13 THE CLERK: I-2. Ordinance amending
14 the Hudson County Administrative Code pursuant to
15 the applicable provisions of Optional County Charter
16 Law, N.J.S.A. 40-41A-1 moving the Office of
17 Emergency Management from the Department of Roads
18 and Public Property to the Sheriff's Office.

19 COMMISSIONER KOPACZ: Sponsor.
20 Kopacz.

21 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Romano-Kopacz.

22 THE CLERK: That's it. Mr.
23 Chairman, that's all I have. I'll use the sponsors
24 for the resolutions to be adopted. I will now turn
25 it over to the Administration.

1 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Go ahead there,
2 Abe.

3 MS. ANTUN: Mr. Chairman, I'm going
4 to ask County Counsel to respond to the two
5 ordinances for public hearing.

6 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Go ahead.

7 MR. DEPIERRO: Yes, Chairman. These
8 two ordinances, which were already introduced, will
9 be moved to the next agenda because of an issue with
10 the timing of the advertisement. We thought it
11 would be better, and I spoke with the counsel to the
12 Board as well, to keep it listed, but it will be put
13 on for the December, the first December agenda, so
14 it has enough time to be properly advertised.

15 THE CLERK: Do you need a motion to
16 table that?

17 MR. DEPIERRO: Counsel Florio said
18 that we don't need a motion because we've already
19 introduced them. We just need the proper time to
20 advertise.

21 MS. MENDIOLA: Commissioners, I spoke
22 to Counsel about this before. So it was a day late,
23 the notice that came out. So you don't need a
24 motion. You can just carry it.

25 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: What about --

1 Commissioners are okay? We want to move the
2 meetings in December to one day, correct? Madam
3 Clerk, explain that to the Board, please.

4 CLERK DOYLE: Thank you. We're just
5 going to move the two meetings together. Because of
6 the holiday, I think that will work for the December
7 meeting. And you approved that already? Yes, the
8 second meeting. Not the first meeting. Are we okay
9 with that?

10 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: How about a motion?

11 CLERK DOYLE: I think we have to
12 motion that at the regular meeting, don't we? Not
13 the caucus.

14 COMMISSIONER KOPACZ: I'll make a
15 motion to make the second meeting in December join
16 to the first meeting of December.

17 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: I'll second that
18 motion.

19 CLERK DOYLE: We can do that.

20 MS. MENDIOLA: What date is that?

21 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: The 10th.

22 MS. ANTUN: No, that's the second
23 meeting. The 20-something.

24 THE CLERK: It's the second meeting.

25 MS. ANTUN: Commissioners, we'll

1 bring the resolution tomorrow. You have to act on
2 the resolution.

3 CLERK DOYLE: Yes.

4 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: The 22nd or the
5 23rd? We're going to combine them both.

6 CLERK DOYLE: We're going to combine
7 them both. So it will be the first date. Yes.
8 That's better, right?

9 MS. MENDIOLA: Can we add the dates
10 of the December meeting for the court reporter?
11 She's kind of a little lost with back and forth, the
12 first and second. Do we have the dates for the
13 December?

14 CLERK DOYLE: For the second meeting.

15 MS. MENDIOLA: What date is that?

16 MS. ANTUN: We'll have that when we
17 have the resolution tomorrow. It can be put on the
18 agenda.

19 COMMISSIONER KOPACZ: So we're going
20 to do like 11 and 1 on the 22nd?

21 MS. ANTUN: Whatever the date is,
22 it'll be something like that, correct, Commissioner?

23 COMMISSIONER KOPACZ: Like eleven and
24 one? Or twelve and one? I thought it was one.

25 THE CLERK: Eleven and one? It has

1 to be before, right? Eleven and one works?

2 COMMISSIONER KOPACZ: On the 22nd,
3 yeah, or one and three. What do you want, one
4 o'clock?

5 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Make it one and
6 two.

7 CLERK DOYLE: One and two? One and
8 two works better? Okay, we'll put that in the form
9 of a resolution.

10 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Any comments from
11 the commissioners? Chief of staff? Jenny, you out
12 there? Tasmanian Devil, you there? Okay.
13 Corrections, anything, anybody?

14 COMMISSIONER KOPACZ: Motion to
15 adjourn.

16 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Second. All in
17 favor. Aye.

18 THE CLERK: We are adjourned.
